## Tribute to Our Fallen Heroes

### *Fallen Heroes Those Who Lost Their Life Protecting Our Freedoms by Bruce Garry*

This year, 2006, is the 75th anniversary of Moultonborough paying tribute to Memorial Day, with a parade and ceremonies. Some were bigger than others, but the people of Moultonborough have always remembered those who served to protect our Freedoms and especially those who lost their lives in doing so.

It couldn't be no more fitting than on this historic anniversary to dedicate a monument that honors those who lost their lives serving our country. As the second phase of the Monument Committee that was chartered at the 2004 Town Meeting, and appointed by the Town Selectmen, a monument will be completed and dedicated this Memorial Day. This monument will have 49 names of men connected to the Town of Moultonborough, who lost their lives serving to protect our Freedoms.

Currently four monuments scattered around town have 11 names of those lost in World War I and II, Korea, and Viet Nam. This monument will bring all these names to one location. It will also add the names from the Revolutionary War and the Civil War.

No this is not meant to be a military monument, but the Town records and Town Lore do not show that we have lost a Police Officer of Firefighter or any other public servant who serve our Town and

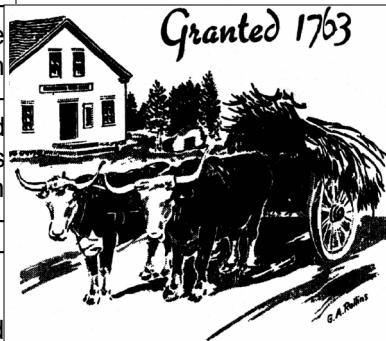

### *A New Public Library Addition includes a New Heritage Room by Jane Rice*

Now that the new addition to the Moultonborough Public Library is open, the various parts of the collection are being re-arranged, and that has resulted in the consolidation of the New Hampshire book collection, plus the various local history resources, in the former Reference Room. At least, the plan is underway, though we are still waiting for some additional construction to take place. Lockable shelves having doors and see-through, breathable grilles are scheduled to be installed on some of the shelves, so that the more valuable and irreplaceable parts of the collection, such as the Civil War regimental histories, will be secured under lock and key. The library staff still wishes to encourage anyone with an interest in local history and genealogy to use the collection, but open access to valuable books is too much of a temptation for some folks, so you will have to ask for access to the locked shelves, but please don't be shy -our mission is to share this material with anyone who has an interest.

So far, all the general-interest New Hampshire books, which were formerly shelved in back of the fireplace, are now in the Heritage Room, and many are displayed on the slanting shelves where the magazines used to be, where we hope they will stir up some interest from passing readers. ## *Memorial Books*

We have three bereavements to report from among the members of our Society since the last newsletter. Adele V. Taylor, because of all she did for the town, including belonging to the Methodist Church for 80-plus years, working at the post office, being a charter member of the Historical Society, and also a long-time Grange member, not to mention 47 years at the public library, Adele is known to most everyone in town. The list of our surviving charter members has dwindled to only a few dedicated souls who remain.

Less well-known town-wide, but also a dear friend of mine, was Carolyn Burke, a summer resident of Ferry Shores for over fifty years. My association with Moultonboro began in 1966, when my parents bought a camp on Ferry Shores for the astronomical sum of \$26,000, which gives the reader an idea how things have changed in forty years. We met the Burkes within the first few days we were there, and have been friends ever since. The four Burke children and I, along with others in the area, swam, sailed the Sunfish, rowed to Arey's Lake-

side Superette for ice cream, and ate lunch wherever we happened to be at the time. If all the bologna sandwiches Carolyn made us were laid end to end they would reach at least up to the corner of Moultonborough Neck Road and Shaker Jerry. The other half of Carolyn's life was spent in Lexington, Mass., and I'm sure she is missed by her many friends in that town as well.

This being the "Historical Society", I try to add books pertaining the New Hampshire history to the collection here at the Moultonborough Public Library in memory of deceased members. Because Adele meant so much to the town, I splurged and bought the "Encyclopedia of New England" in her memory. Written by a couple of UNH professors, David Watters and Burt Feintuch, the book is a monumental tome that references many aspects of New England life and culture and should be a standard reference work to be consulted for many years to come. Patrons are also welcome to take it home to read, but so far most have been a bit daunted by the size of the volume. I'm hoping that this article will encourage some daring Society members to give it a try, as it has so much that they would enjoy and learn from. It's not like you have to read every page in two weeks - just browse through the parts that interest you, and leave the rest for later. It does have pictures, too.

Our third member to pass away was Archie Reynolds, and that has happened so recently that I have not yet discovered a New Hampshire history book to purchase for his memorial. Archie was a resident of Richardson Shores, who retired up here with his wife Marion after being a truck driver for 35 years, and he also belonged to the Methodist Church, Snowmobile Club, and the Grange.

A total of 113 former Society members are remembered at the library by the generous donation of memorial books, which over the years has made a big difference in our local history collection and has given those readers and researchers interested in New Hampshire and New England history a big boost.

# Moultonborough History Museum Committee News

The Moultonborough History Museum Committee met on Monday, April 24 at the Vic Hamke Room, which is a wonderful space for small and medium sized meetings. The first order of business was to set some times and dates for work sessions to clean the Museum room at the Lamprey House and to begin the work of cleaning out the barn. Some of the articles in the barn will be very useful in the new rooms of the Lamprey House, others need to be stored in the upper rooms, some needs to be thrown away, and the rest will be cleaned and/or restored for exhibit.

The History Museum Committee hopes to have the new rooms in show condition for the July 4th open house and the barn ready for visitors by early August. We will need volunteers to help with the work, or we will need to hire people. We're hoping, of course, for volunteers and a sign up sheet will be circulated at the next couple of regular meetings.

In addition we talked about many things, from the possibility of hiring a part-time, year round Museum administrator/curator, various events and uses for the entry room, and the Hamke room, and the types of exhibits that can be displayed in those rooms and not be damaged by visitors.

local history. Years ago, when Adele Taylor was our librarian, both for the town and the historical society, she would cut out various feature articles, obituaries, death, birth, and marriage notices, graduation reports, etc., from local newspapers, without dating them, and when she had a big manila envelope full, she would cause me to paste them into scrapbooks.

Lots of folks have enjoyed poring over these old memories over the years, and they had taken a beating, especially because they were original cheap newsprint pasted onto cheap, acidic scrap paper, which was rapidly crumbling at the edges. Mary has been extremely diligent in photocopying all these old articles onto acid-free paper and using town reports and other outside sources to get them into chronological order. It's been years since I had time as part of my library duties to keep adding current articles to the scrapbooks, so it was also wonderful to have her bring them up to date. We now have a very useful resource for local history, especially so because the information is hard to find elsewhere.

The Meredith Public Library has Meredith News papers in their collection, but the Moultonboro items are mixed up with everything else, and the same goes for the Granite State News in Wolfeboro and the Citizen in Laconia. These new, well-organized, and uniform-sized books bring together a wealth of information just pertaining to Moultonboro and the folks who have lived here. It's probably true to say that you couldn't pay someone to do this kind of work, and certainly our Society couldn't afford to do it, so all we can do is give a heartfelt "thank you" to Mary for her untiring devotion to this project.

country - *thank goodness and may it stay that way.*

The names that will be found on this monument is the results of 700 plus hours of research over the past 19 months by myself with great assistance by Jane Rice. The search took me to the State Military Records Archives, the State Archives, the State Library, New Hampshire Historical Society, the National Archives in Waltham, MA, the Meredith Library, the Town Hall, and Town Library. I wrote several letters to the National Archives Records, College Park, MD, and to Military Records in St. Louis, MO.

Volumes of information was also gathered from sources on the Internet. I have new friends I didn't have before from as far away as Australia and Luxemburg.

We also wish to thank many others helped to provide us with valuable information and photos, especially the families who lost a family member or family descendant. Their trust to allow us to borrow fragile historic documents helped immensely gives us a more complete story of WHO these men were. We wanted more than just names on a stone. The results of this intensive search will eventually be available to the public so future generations can learn who these men were and what they did for all of us.

Of course there is always more we can learn of these men. If anyone has any information on these men or pictures of them, PLEASE let me or Jane Rice know. We would be forever grateful.

If you know of someone we have missed, PLEASE let us know. This monument is designed so that names can be added, if we unfortunately have another Fallen Hero.

With a brief history, here are the 49 *Fallen Heroes* of Our Town - Moultonborough.

**William Blake**, age unknown, Private, Major James Norris' Company, 3<sup>rd</sup> New Hampshire Regiment, Continental Army. Fifteen months service, one major battle. Killed Valley Forge Encampment, Pennsylvania, May 12, 1778

**John H. Clement**, 19, Private, Company G, 3<sup>rd</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Four months of service with one major combat engagement, Died of Disease, Hilton Head, South Carolina, December 3, 1861

**William B. Young**, 25, Private, Company D, 8<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Two months of service, Died of Disease, Fort Independence, Boston, Massachusetts, February 2, 1862

**John F. Fall**, 24, Private, Company D, 6<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Five months service, Died of Disease, Annapolis, Maryland, February 22, 1862

**Alonzo G. Lamprey**, 18, Private, Company D, 8<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Two months of service, Died of Disease, Fort Independence, Boston, Massachusetts, February 25, 1862

**George Evans**, 18, Private, Company K, 4<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Six months of service with one major combat engagement, Died of Disease, on board the steamship "Empire City", March 2, 1862

**John B. Hutchins**, 22, Private, Company D, 4<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Eight months service with one major combat engagement, Died of Disease, St. Augustine, Florida, April 13, 1862

**Woodbury C. White**, 18, Private, Company B, 8<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Five months of service, Died of Disease, Ship Island, Mississippi, May 12, 1862

**Moses R. Kelley**, 34, Private, Company K, 7<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Ten months of service, Died of Disease, Beaufort, South Carolina, August 17, 1862

**Josiah A. Ladd**, 20, Corporal, Company G, 3<sup>rd</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. One year of service with four major combat engagements, Died of Disease, Hilton Head, South Carolina, August 25, 1862

**Charles H. Brown**, 19, Private, Company G, 3<sup>rd</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Fourteen months of service with four major combat engagements, Died of Disease, Hilton Head, South Carolina, September 9, 1862

**George H. Moulton**, 22, Private, Company I, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Two months of service, Died of Disease, Washington, DC, October 22, 1862

**Converse C. Randall**, 20, Private, Company H, 5<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. One year of service with nine major combat engagements, Died of Disease, Bolivar Heights, Virginia, October 27, 1862

**Josiah B. Hill**, 24, Private, Company I, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Four months of service, Died of Disease, Harper's Ferry, West Virginia, November 9, 1862

**Josiah S. Brown**, 44, Private, Company G, 5<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Four and a half months service with 3 major combat engagements, Killed in Action at the Battle of Fredericksburg, Virginia, December 13, 1862

**Smith P. Davis**, 30, Corporal, Company H, 5<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Fifteen months service with eleven major combat engagements, Died of Wounds received at the Battle of Fredericksburg, at Falmouth, Virginia, December 20, 1862

**Bradford Leach**, 18, Private, Company I, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Four months service with one major combat engagement, Died of Disease, Falmouth, Virginia, December 25, 1862

**William B. Worth**, 18, Private, Company G, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Nine months service with two major combat engagements, Killed in Action at the Battle of Chancellorsville, Virginia, May 3, 1863

**Lowell F. Sanborn**, 20, Sergeant, Company I, 8<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Seventeen months service, with five major combat engagements, Died of Disease, New Orleans, Louisiana, May 24, 1863

**Charles G. Smith**, 31, Corporal, Company D, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hamp-

shire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Nine months service, with two major combat engagements, Died of Wounds received at the Battle of Chancellorsville, at Aquia Creek, Virginia, June 6, 1863

**Gilman M. Blake**, 29, Corporal, Company H, 16<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Nine months service, with three major combat engagements, Died of Disease, New Orleans, Louisiana, June 17, 1863

**Joseph Wallis**, 42, Private, Company I, 12<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Eleven months service, with three major combat engagements, Killed in Action at the Battle of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, July 2, 1863

**Joseph L. Goodwin**, 26, Private, Company L, 4<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Volunteer Cavalry Regiment, Union Army. Two months service, Died causes Unknown, Fort Monroe, Virginia, September 30, 1864

**Thomas S. Adams**, 30, Private, Company K, 14<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Twenty-five months service, with nine major combat engagements, Died of Disease, at home, Moultonborough, New Hampshire, October 26, 1864

**Samuel W. Hutchins**, 18, Private, Company C, 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment, New Hampshire Volunteer Cavalry, Union Army. **Joseph Whitten**, 47, Private, Company H, 5<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Three years four months service, with 18 major combat engagements, wounded at the Battles of Fair Oaks and Fredericksburg. He was Captured by Confederates at the Battle of Ream's Station, Petersburg, Virginia, August 25, 1864. Died causes Unknown, Salisbury Confederate Prison Camp, Salisbury, North Carolina, January 3, 1865

**John F. Evans**, 23, Corporal, Company C, 9<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Twenty-six months service, with 15 major combat engagements, Captured by Confederates at the Mine Explosion, Petersburg, Virginia, July 30, 1864. Died of Disease, Danville Confederate Prison Camp, Danville, Virginia, January 17, 1865

**William Nicholas**, 29, Private, Company B, 7<sup>th</sup> New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. 18 months service, two major combat engagements, Captured by Confederates at the Battle of Olustee, Florida, February 20, 1864, held by Confederates for 12 months. He Died of Disease eight days after being released, Wilmington, North Carolina, March 18, 1865

**John M. Brown**, 19, Private, Company H, 17<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Union Army. Five months service,

with one major combat engagement. Died causes Unknown, New York, June 9, 1865

**Harold E. Glidden**, 24, Private, U.S. Army, Battery F, 303<sup>rd</sup> Field Artillery, 151<sup>st</sup> Artillery Brigade, 76<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Four months service. Died of Disease, Camp Devens, Massachusetts, January 23, 1918

**John H. Moulton**, 32, Private, U.S. Army, Company F, 103<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Regiment, 52<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Brigade, 26<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Thirteen months service, Killed in Action as the division was moving into the line for it's first action, in the Pas Fini Sector, near Lorraine, France, July 6, 1918

**Leroy E. Dow**, 27, Corporal, U.S. Army, Company F, 103<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Regiment, 52<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Brigade, 26<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Fourteen months service, with three major combat engagements, Killed in Action at St. Mihiel, France, September 13, 1918

**Frank D. Bartlett**, 23, Private, U.S. Army and U.S. Marine Corps., Units Unknown. Three years four months service, Died of Pneumonia, U.S. Marine Corps. Hospital, Staten Island, New York, October 7, 1918

**Ralph L. Mack**, 26, Private, U.S. Army, Battery F, 303<sup>rd</sup> Field Artillery, 151<sup>st</sup> Artillery Brigade, 76<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Four months service. Died of Disease on board ship crossing over to France or on arrival to France, November 16, 1918

**Patrick Cunningham**, 30, service unknown. He is on the Moultonborough Town World War I Monument as having died in the service of our country. A resident of town at the time of the war, after an extensive search no service information has been found. Presumed to have died in 1918

**Horace P. Olden**, 25, Tech Sergeant, U.S. Army Air Corps, unit unknown at this time. Three years

six months service, and was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and Air Medal with Two Oak Clusters. He was Wounded while flying as a Top Turret Gunner in a B-17 over Hungary. He Died of Wounds, Foggia, Italy, July 28, 1944.

**Warren E. Huston**, 22, Sergeant, U.S. Army Air Corps., Headquarters Squadron, 3<sup>rd</sup> Bomber "Attack" Group Light. Three years six months service including Australia and New Guinea. He Drowned in Lake Sentani, near Hollandia, New Guinea, August 2, 1944

**George O. Maxwell**, 35, Private, U.S. Army, 358<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment, 90<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Eight months service, with five months on the front lines attacking the Germans across France, and was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously. Killed in Action, as the regiment, with elements of the 10<sup>th</sup> Armored Division, were assaulting the Siegfried Line, near Borg, Germany, November 24, 1944.

**Kenneth C. Foss**, 22, Private First Class, U.S. Army, 5<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Regiment, 1<sup>st</sup> Cavalry Division. Nine months service, with four months of continuous combat. He was wounded September 29, 1951 and returned to duty. Reported Missing in Action in combat near Hill 346, known as "Old Baldy", South Korea on October 19, 1951. His status was changed to Killed in Action, without explanation, and his body was never recovered, December 1951

**Steven W. Martin**, 24, Captain, U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, Helicopter, Marine Medium - 362 Squadron the "Ugly Angels", Marine Air Group -16, 1<sup>st</sup> Marine Air Wing. Two years nine months service, and was awarded posthumously the Bronze Star with Combat V, and the Air Medal with numeral 40, for flying 800 combat missions. He was killed when the rotor-blades of the helicopter he was piloting collided with the rotor-blades of another helicopter mid-air, while supplying Marines on Hill 52, south of Da Nang, South Viet Nam, November 10, 1968.

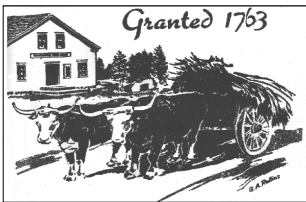
